AGENT ORANGE: "Everything Turns Grey" b/w "Pipeline" (Poshboy)

Ventures meet Blue Oyster Cult (really!) on two sides by this LA post-punk trio. The garage-rock classic on the A-side is speedy and catchy, and their version of the oft-covered "Pipeline" is nothing short of righteous.

MISFITS: 3 Hits from Hell EP (Plan 9)

"London Dungeon" is dark, Doorsy and atypically mute for these New Jersey horror punks, which may be why it's one of their best songs. "Horror Hotel" and "Ghoul's Night Out" are parapunk bashers and pretty good, too.

ONYX: "Call of the Wild" b/w "S.O.S." (Nu-Age)

"Call of the Wild"'s throbbing bass hook makes it the best song Public Image Ltd. never wrote. This Boston mystery duo's previous single ("Jet Set" b/w "Saturn 09") is also worth checking out.

PELL MELL: Rhyming Guitars EP (Indoor)

Like the Raybeats, this Seattle quartet (now a trio) recalls the glory days of Ventures instrumentals. Unlike the Raybs, Pell Mell goes for a rough, fast approach (especially on "Spy vs. Spy") which is half their attractiveness.

PRETTY POISON: "No Tears" b/w "Sakii" (Svengali flexidisc)

It's one thing even to think of covering a Tuxedomoon song, never mind improving on the original. But this furious remake of "No Tears" leaves the Tuxmen in the dust. And singer Jade Starling is much better looking than Tuxedomoon's Winston Tong.

PYLON: "Crazv" b/w "M Train" (DB)

This was virtually a two-sided hit for Pylon; almost every college radio station and rock club was playing it. "Crazy" explores new avenues of melodicism, while "M Train" summarizes the stark dance rhythms of the **Gyrate** LP. One of the year's best, period.

QUIET ROOM: "She Sits Alone" b/w "Pictures in the Attic" (Win)

The Black Forest comes to Silicon Valley—another way of saying these California synth boys have beaten Ultravox at their own game. Lush and romantic (not electronic disco, though), and unnerving around the edges.

R.E.M.: "Radio For Physics" b/w "Sitting Still" (The Tone)

Plazing, edgy pop from the town that gave us Pylon, in. 52 girls and umpty-ump other great bands. Rough production only addition its appeal. Prelude to an IRS contract. Way to go.

NORMAN SALANT: Saxophone Demonstrations EP (Alive)

Between studio dates with Romeo Void and the Residents, Salant found time to commit his experiments with massed, minimalist-riff saxes to vinyl. His collapsing of Blondie's "Accidents Never Happen" is a hoot.

WRINKLEMUZIK: Wrinklemuzik EP (Exit)

The wrinkle in Kenn Lowy's music is that he plays it a nimself, in real conjugator synthesizer and electronic beat the does a great Frippertronics routine, but the deceptivery simple riffs of "A Move to the Right" made my short hairs stand on end. Favorite synthesizer record of the year.
